

Law 13 of 1978 Evidence Law, 1978, to appear before a court and to be about to leave the Islands without the permission of that court while such security remains in force.”;

B. in section 34 by the substitution of a colon (:) for the full stop (.) at the end of subsection (3) and the addition of the following proviso thereto –

“Provided that if the person so taken into custody appears to be a visitor to the Islands and so unable to provide sureties the officer may against a proper receipt delivered to such person for retention by him, accept cash or other tangible security in lieu of sureties, such cash or other security to be handed over to the Summary Court at its next sitting if not returned to the person providing the same prior to such sitting.”.

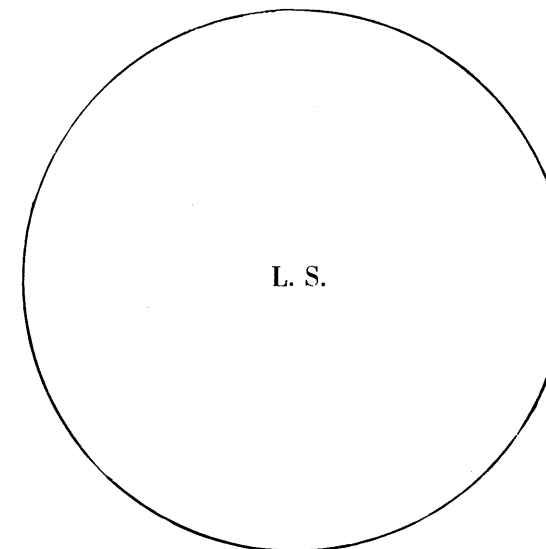

**A LAW to amend the Police Law
(Law 5 of 1976).**

ENACTED by the Legislature of the Cayman Islands.

Short title.

Law 5 of
1976 amended.

1. This Law may be cited as the Police (Amendment) Law, 1979.
2. The Police Law is hereby amended as follows –
 - A. in section 33 –
 - (a) by deleting the word “and” immediately following paragraph (j);
 - (b) by deleting the words “any person” at the beginning of paragraph (k) and substituting a semi-colon for the full stop at the end thereof; and
 - (c) by adding the following two new paragraphs at the end thereof –
 - “(1) whom the officer suspects on reasonable grounds to be remanded or bound over to answer a criminal charge before a court and to be about to leave the Islands without the permission of that court; and
 - (m) whom the officer suspects on reasonable grounds to have given security under section 49 of the
