

## THE AIRPORTS REGULATION LAW (REVISED) THE AIRPORTS (SECURITY TAX) REGULATIONS, 1985

In exercise of the powers conferred upon the Governor in Council by paragraph (f) of section 3 of the Airports Regulation Law (Revised), the following Regulations are hereby made -

Citation and comment.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Airports (Security Tax) Regulations, 1985 and shall come into operation on the 1st day of March, 1985.

2. In these Regulations—

Interpretation

"airport" means an airport designated under the Designated Airports Regulations, 1978;

"carrier" means a person having a proprietorial interest in an aircraft;

"Director" means the Director of Civil Aviation;

"outward bound aircraft" mean an aircraft about to journey from the Islands to a jurisdiction thereout;

"traveller" means a person not under the age of twelve years, other than —

- (a) a member of the crew of an aircraft carried thereon for the exclusive purpose of taking part in the management of its service;
- (b) a person accorded diplomatic immunity under any Law;
- (c) a person travelling from one foreign location to another and breaking his journey in the Islands for a period not exceeding twenty-four hours;
- (d) a person present in the Islands solely for the purpose of the necessary servicing of an aircraft or for receiving necessary emergency medical treatment:
  (e) a person departing from the Islands in order to receive medical treatment on the written advice of a docter employed by the Government;
- (f) a person specifically exempted by the Director or other office in charge of the day-to-day administration of an airport.
